Lenzing plans an expansion in Brazil, focusing on FSC procurement outside ancient and endangered forests, however, as this expansion comes online, further screening is recommended as Brazil currently captures international attention due to significant erosion of the National Forest Code, as well as legal protections for indigenous rights and other environmental regulations. Lenzing has been a continuous leader in recent years, as has been the first to be marketed with lyocell fibre containing 30% pre-recyclable pre-consumption content-based cotton waste, with 10% after the consumer; a new idea has also been launched to make the recycling of textile waste as common as paper recycling, and a target of reaching 50% of recycled products by 2024. The Austrian company Lenzing has joined us to tell us more about what they are doing and to discuss their problem with pollution at one of their facilities in Asia. Lenzing – Materials innovation underpins sustainable fashion Stephanie Kniep, head of investor relations at Lenzing started the session explaining what the company is doing; wood-based fibres derived from pulp. Lenzing sells fibres in a number of end markets, including the fashion industry, where their products, such as TENCEL, are better quality, environmentally friendly alternatives to cotton. The production method reduces the use of water and pesticides and 99.9% of the chemicals used in the process are recovered in a closed-loop system instead of entering the wastewater stream. To put this product into context, you can buy a range of clothes made from TENCEL's GAP. In a Changing Markets Foundation report last year, Lenzing's factory in West Java, Indonesia was named the Changing Markets Foundation's Dirty Fashion report, which condemned bad practices in viscose manufacturing. The charges included poor waste management, water pollution, sulphur emissions and an accident caused by gas leaks that initiating several people. WHEB head of research Seb Beloe then opened a discussion on stage with Stephanie and Peter Bartsch, head of corporate sustainability at Lenzing about how lenzing reacted to Lenzing. WHEB discovered the report through continuous monitoring of portfolio companies. We contacted the report authors to better understand the allegations, and then contacted Lenzing to encourage them to respond. Peter explained how they reacted. We had an internal discussion and decided to talk about changing to understand we can support their initiative and learn more about how to develop the proposed roadmap for development. We have looked at individual issues and made changes, such as increasing waste capacity in line with production growth. In response to the non-intole review, Lenzing decided to go further with the improvements, which were fully supported by WHEB. Besides internal programs to reduce these types of issues and follow-up technological developments, it has produced a longer-term strategy for Lenzing. We have clearly set 10 reduction targets and decided to set a standard for all factories in the world. We have compiled in Indonesia, but the standards are not good enough today, we need to go further, so we want to introduce a group standard so that all our facilities operate in the same sustainable way. Seb Beloe really wanted to know how long this was going to take. Peter replied that the global standard should be in place by 2022, as some investment would be needed. Seb praised Lenzing for his response to the report. In my experience, companies often become very defensive when they see a report from a non-non-organisation criticising them. Many of your industry colleagues have accepted this attitude and tried to undermine the report, so I think it is very commendable that you have been involved with it and used it as an opportunity to develop. To finish the session, Lenzing explained what they had learned from this process. Peter said: We have to get over compliance, we always have to get a little ahead of regulation because it's a moving target. Open discussion is also very important and we have communicated with our customers and were pleased with our changes and the schedule we are working on.
